

What to do:

In Term 1 2008:

1. One teacher per school must register as a participant with the Education Advisor, Western Water: telephone **9218 5421** or email **rebecca.colless@westernwater.com.au**
2. Photocopy this page – one copy per student.
3. The school is responsible for collecting parent / guardian consent for each student's participation in this fundraising activity. The form at right can be cut out, used, and retained by the school.
4. Collect one empty, clean 410 g can per student.
5. Cut out the wrapper below around the dotted line, and fasten it around the can with glue or tape.

On World Water Day (22 March 2008 - Easter Saturday):

Each student should put his or her can in the family's bathroom or toilet, and ask family and friends to "spend a penny" (place a donation in the can) each time they use the toilet.

By 22 April 2008:

Return all donations (the registering teacher will receive a form with instructions for doing this).
